January 27, 2021, Miami Gardens, FL- Florida Memorial University has been selected by Google, in partnership with the Thurgood Marshall College Fund (TMCF), to participate in the Grow with Google's (GwG) HBCU Career Readiness Program. This new initiative will embed HBCU student jobseeker resources into a select number of Historically Black Colleges & Universities (HBCU) career services centers, with the goal of helping 100,000 Black students gain digital skills needed to find and land entry level jobs and internships and to be successful in the workplace. The funds will support activities with the Intentional Readiness for Occupational Acquisition and Retention (iROAR) Program, and the FMU Career Development Center.

Dr. Tameka Hobbs, Associate Provost for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Kelley Kimple, Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs will serve as principal investigators for the program.

During the 2020-2021 school year, the program will launch at 20+ institutions and train 20,000 Black students on professional digital skills. As a recipient, FMU will receive:

- Micro Funding for program implementation
- Interactive learning paths that will help students build both the digital and practical skills needed to land and thrive in a post-college job or internship;
- Train-the-trainer learning paths for Career Development Center staff;

Opportunity to contribute to a playbook that will then be used to scale Grow with Google's HBCU Career Readiness Program to all 100+ HBCUs, allowing us to extend GwG's reach to 100,000 HBCU students.
